INSPIRE – EDUCATE – ENLIGHTEN

The Australian Romantic & Classical Orchestra specialises in period instrument performances of late 18th- to early 20th-century orchestral and chamber music, and is at the forefront of the historical performance (HIP) scene, staying abreast with the latest research and developments around the world by collaborating with key guest musicians and musicologists. Under the artistic direction of Rachael Beesley and Nicole van Bruggen, the orchestra has been praised for its "intelligent and warm performances, demonstrating the importance of historically informed musicianship and showcasing the impact of period instruments with gut strings" (ArtsHub, 2020).

Founded in 2012 under the artistic direction of renowned musician and educator, the late **Richard Gill**, the orchestra is now, in its 10th year, a dynamic influence on the Australian music scene. Its twin goals of performance and education are achieved through live concerts in Australia's capital cities and in metropolitan and regional centres, collaborations with guest ensembles, broadcasts and recordings, innovative music education programs, pre-concert presentations and specialist online resources. Gathering together leading Australian and international exponents, the Australian Romantic & Classical Orchestra brings historical insights and new perspectives to masterpieces from the Classical and Romantic periods.

The orchestra's unique music education series, **Voyage of Musical Discovery**, is presented in Sydney, Brisbane and, this year, in Melbourne for the first time. The Voyage is equal parts concert and demonstration, and features collaborations with exceptional guest musicians and ensembles to explore through words and music the compositonal similarities between historical and Australian contemporary works.

Young Mannheim Symphonists

Directed by Rachael Beesley and Nicole van Bruggen, the Young Mannheim Symphonists youth orchestra program, gives students and emerging professional musicians a chance to experience first-hand the excitement of discovering music through the lens of historical performance style. At the same time, the program enables us to nurture HIP musicians for the future.

Each year, the Young Mannheim Symphonists explore music from the Classical and Romantic periods, bringing it to life under the guidance of professional musicians experienced in historically informed performance. Exposed to this extraordinary wealth of knowledge and insight, they are empowered to begin making informed musical decisions of their own.

The program tutors are Australian Romantic & Classical Orchestra principal musicians, whose passion for understanding our musical heritage in its historical context is matched by their passion for inspiring and enlightening the next generation of HIP musicians.

Rachael Beesley | conductor and director



Rachael Beesley is a renowned Australian-British musician and educator specialising in historically informed performance. She has appeared as guest concertmaster with Europe's most distinguished HIP ensembles, including Anima Eterna Brugge, La Petite Bande and the New Dutch Academy; as guest director of Les Muffatti (Brussels) and NZBarok (Auckland); and in festivals and concert halls worldwide. In addition to her role as co-artistic director and concertmaster of the Australian Romantic & Classical Orchestra, she has also appeared as concertmaster with the Australian Brandenburg Orchestra, Pinchgut Opera, Opera Australia and Victorian Opera. She is regularly invited to direct modern orchestras from

the violin, including the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra, Melbourne Chamber Orchestra and Adelaide Chamber Players, and is in demand as a chamber musician and soloist, collaborating with living composers as well as exploring repertoire from the 17th to the 21st centuries on period instruments. Rachael Beesley teaches at the Melbourne and Sydney conservatoriums, the Royal Conservatorie in The Hague, and at Monash University.
